World Vision is working to help girls fight for their rights - the right to be free from fear. Free from rape, abuse and violence.

12 million girls marry before the age of 18 every year. That's 22 girls every minute.





At least 120 million girls under the age of 20 - about 1 in 10 have been forced to engage in sex or perform other sexual acts, although the actual figure is likely much higher.

60% of all trafficking victims worldwide are women and girls.





At least 200 million women and girls aged 15-49 have undergone FGM in 30 countries where representative data is available. See how 14-year-old Leah (pictured) is fighting FMG in Kenya.

She has a name: Monika

Monika is fighting child marriage

World Vision works with communities to break down the systems and beliefs that force girls into

marriage. Girls and women are empowered as decision makers and agents of change - to say no to child marriage.

Monika, (pictured above and right), an 18-year-old from a rural community in Bangladesh, stood up to child marriage and **not** only escaped being a child bride - she is now helping countless other girls facing a similar nightmare.

"I did not know what to do"

Rahima* was just 14 years old when she discovered she was to be married to someone she'd never met. "I did not know what to do," she said. "When I found out, I cried a lot."

Rahima was going to accept her fate - but then she heard about Monika.

Monika also comes from a family where child marriage was seen as normal. She explains, "In various sessions at World Vision, I came to know about the physical and psychological damage child marriage has on a child." Even though both her mother and her sister were married as children, she was able to choose a different path after she shared what she had learned with her family.

But Monika didn't stop there. She decided to take a stand with a group of friends. Now, she and her team are on the frontline of the battle against child marriage by exposing its harms to local families and the authorities. "So far I have stopped 10 marriages," she says. "My team and I believe that child marriage can be prevented if we all work together."

Rahima contacted her and the team visited her home. Monika adds, "When we get information about any child marriage, we immediately inform the local administration. With their help, we stop child marriage through the mobile court as well."

Free to dream again

Thanks to Monika and her team, who convinced Rahima's parents that child marriage is harmful, Rahima's marriage was stopped. She is now back in school, dreaming of becoming a lawyer – and sharing with other girls what she learned through her experience about the power of speaking up.

Sheyla is just 12 years old – but that doesn't stop her fighting for change. For girls in Guatemala life is hard. Almost a third are married or partnered before they're 18, and violence is rife. Education levels are low, with only four out of 10 secondary school-aged girls enrolled. "Girls are not respected, and they are put down," says Sheyla. "But I have learned about our rights: the right to have an identity and education." She's even met with Guatemala's Vice President to present the needs of their community. Find out more
